Provide shelter, safety, and food for the orphaned and abused animals of Washington County with the goal of placing them in loving homes.

The Washington Area Humane Society is a no-kill shelter, meaning we do not euthanize animals to make room for other animals. The WAHS gives every animal a chance at a loving permanent home regardless of age or medical condition. 98% of the pets served are from Washington County. The WAHS is 100% funded by private contributions and donations.

EDUCATION

Provide public education about the humane care and treatment of animals.

WELLNESS

Provide affordable veterinary outpatient services including spaying or neutering.

INVESTIGATE

Investigate and resolve abuse cases in the best interests of the animal and community.







Happy — **Outcomes**

While our adoption process is thorough, our team works closely together to ensure that each home is the perfect fit for that pet. In 2021. The WAHS return rate of 6% was the lowest it has ever been in five years.



Lite Saving Animal Wellness

With a full-time Veterinarian and medical team, the WAHS offers every animal excellent medical care. Upon intake at the WAHS, every pet receives a wellness exam, including a full set of vaccinations, fecal analysis, de-wormer, flea and tick treatment, nail trim, microchip, lyme/heartworm test, and spay/neuter surgery. Along with all of the medical treatments, there is fun; enrichment, behavior plans, play-time, dog walks, and play yard fun.

Affordable —— Pet Clinics

After limiting services in 2020, we added more low-cost vaccination and surgery clinics in May 2021. Because of the Covid-19 restrictions, many pet owners struggled to get their pets into vet offices. By reopening our veterinary services, community pets were able to receive the necessary – yet affordable – services they need to remain safe and healthy members of their families. Our clinic services lead by our medical team impacted over 1,000 community pets.

In 2020, the WAHS, with the support of CentiMark Corporation, established the Emergency Pet Food Response Program to assist families in our community retain their pets by providing pet food and other essential supplies. In 2021, we continued this critical resource and hosted an onsite drive-through food distribution at our facility and also partnered with Food Helpers in November to give food to pets for the Thanksgiving holiday.


Foster ——

Homes

As we shifted to staggered schedules, fewer staff and volunteers in the building throughout 2020 and 2021, we needed to find creative solutions to maintain the highest level of care for our animal residents. The answer, fosters!

We expanded our foster program in 2020 and continued the trend in 2021. Prior to the Covid-19 pandemic only 20 animals on average were placed into foster homes. In 2021, 170 animals were placed into foster homes! Our team was able to implement this newly founded program by receiving support for our foster network through grants which enabled us to purchase much needed foster home items.

Humane -

Investigations

The WAHS employs one full-time Humane Society Police Officer (HSPO) who is trained and certified to investigate reports of neglect, cruelty, and abuse of animals in Washington County. In 2021, the WAHS Humane Investigation Unit responded to 303 calls from concerned community members reporting suspected animal neglect, abandonment, and cruelty.

Our Humane Investigation Unit serves as an important resource to Washington County residents by also offering education and training on Pennsylvania Animal Cruelty Laws to law enforcement agencies, municipalities, and community partners.

Compassion — Care Initiative






REVENUE **\$1,456,033**
